
BELL SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY FAIR 2010 – KELLS STUDENTS MAKE US PROUD!



Devastation descended upon the Haitian capital of Port au Prince on January 12th, 2010. The 7.0 magnitude earthquake trapped and killed thousands and left millions homeless and hungry. The overwhelming images presented by the media were horrifying and heartwrenching.

OVERCOMING THE ODDS



Guest speaker Denys Heward

On April 6th, we had the opportunity to welcome author Denys Heward, a former teacher and assistant director at Lower Canada College middle school. Mr. Heward inspired our grades 7, 8, and 9 students, recounting stories of his past, first as a student with learning disabilities, and then as a teacher.

"Awesome," is how one of the students described the presenter. "It was amazing to hear him talk about the same problems I had in the classroom."

Inspired by reading Mr. Heward's book, The Bugle Sounded One Note, we made the decision to invite him to share his experiences with our students. As expected from a master teacher, one who was determined to overcome all odds, we were not disappointed. For over an hour, he regaled us with his stories as a struggling student whose journey led him to find a passion in life that would ultimately become his career.

Using many anecdotes from his days as a student, he described his humiliation at not being able to read, write or do math while other students seemed to acquire these skills almost effortlessly. In addition to these challenges, he was left-handed at a time when that too was unacceptable, and was thus forced to write with his right hand. In spite of these struggles, he somehow knew he could succeed.

His parents agreed and decided to send him to Lower Canada College in grade 4. His struggle continued, since in those days schools were not familiar with what is now called Dyslexia. He was later diagnosed as having ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder). Luckily, as often happens, one teacher made all the difference.

The kindness and understanding of his grade 4 teacher made the classroom a meaningful experience. He became involved in many aspects of school life and developed a deep interest for what was to become a lifelong passion for the events of the past, and the rest, as they say, is history.

His enthusiasm for this subject ultimately gave him the drive and determination to go on to college and earn a degree. After graduating, he was invited back to Lower Canada College as a member of the faculty. This was the beginning of a career spanning 35 years.

As the parent of one of his students, I can attest to how he enriched the lives of his pupils. My son recalls the way he brought historical figures to life through drama. His great contribution to LCC is the annual "History Night," which continues today.

We are grateful to Mr. Heward for coming to Kells to share his experiences with our students. His story showed us that no matter what the obstacle is, great things can happen with motivation, passion, hard work and determination.

On January 27th 2010, the world lost an American icon. J. D. Salinger, the author of such classics as Nine Stories, Seymour: An Introduction, and of course The Catcher in the Rye, passed away in his New Hampshire home. It is hard to say that it was then that the world lost him. In truth, we never really had him. Salinger lived alone and did not go out. No one had seen him in years and that was how he preferred it. While his books have received much

critical acclaim, he has never been a public figure or celebrity. It is truly his books that are famous, most notably The Catcher in the Rye that has been both loved and hated by millions and has been at the center of controversy for decades. Although he has died, his books will continue to be important figures in American culture for a long time to come. People do not live forever, but those with great legacies are remembered forever.— Bryant Richards
