

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Science & Technology 2013 Fair!










The Science Fair is an annual event at Kells. This year, it took place on the 8th of February. Students in various grades started working on their projects early in September. They went through three stages some projects were experimentation and design and were planned, executed at home or school or in an acknowledged research lab before getting to the final stages of being presented in front of the students and presence of supportive parents. As part of the Kells' mission to develop scientific curiosity in students. quide them on how to apply scientific methods and relate science to everyday life our goal was to expose the students to both local and regional competitions where they would have an opportunity to excel and be active participants in the dynamic science students' life in Montreal. The top three projects, school wide, were selected by the judges according to the age group in both design and experimentation domains. Trophies were awarded at school together with honorable mentions and certificates of participation. The winners represented the school in the annual Montreal Regional Science and Technology Fair where they spent three days exhibiting their work, competing with other students from local private and public schools and collecting awards at the final stage. Resource room - a great new space

Kells Academy's new resource room is a welcoming and multi-functional space painted in bright, modern colours, with student artwork displayed prominently. Large, floor-to-ceiling windows look out over beautiful Trenholme Park, filling the room with natural light. Part of the room is set up as an informal gathering area, where comfortable chairs allow students to relax or collaborate in a quiet space. When required, a moveable wall at one end of the room can be opened, which combines the resource room and the library into one large open space for meetings or presentations.

Tables, desks and chairs allow students to work either individually, in small groups or in larger classes. A brand-new Smart Board permits us to access and share a variety of multimedia and online material, as well as providing an interactive platform for recording notes that can be instantly shared via email or the Kells Portal. Around the room, colourful posters remind students to apply strategies when they are working on writing, studying, note-taking or reading-comprehension tasks.

Many students spend time in the resource room. In each grade, groups of students have been hand picked to attend regular Learning Support classes, which are designed to build independent learning skills while providing support for academic assignments throughout the year. Students in these classes learn to apply a


variety of strategies to keep themselves organized, motivated and successful. Since all students have iPads or laptops, they also write personal strategy blogs and learn to use different types of assistive technology programs and apps, such as mind mapping and text-to-speech software.

Other students use the resource room to work during recess, lunch or regular class time. Students can work independently to complete projects, write tests, or meet with the Resource teacher to work on organization, project planning, goal setting and reflection.

The resource room is a key component of Kells Academy's approach to individualizing education to meet the needs of all our students.


The Roots of Soul

Viva España! Culture, Cuisine and Castanets

During the March break, 14 students ventured on an excursion to Spain. The trip would take them from Barcelona to Gibraltar while touring the Andalusia area and the Alpujarras mountains. In Barcelona, students took in the unique works of the famous architect Antoni Gaudi which included the incomplete Sagrada Familia, la Pedrera and the majestic Park Guell.

After visiting the Moorish castle of Alhambra in Grenada and learning the basic steps of flamenco dancing, students traveled through the twists and turns of the Alpujarras mountains to stay in a secluded eco lodge. They were treated to a once-in-a-lifetime cooking workshop in Narilas, a town with a population of about 80 people, where they were welcomed with open arms by the inhabitants of this beautiful region.

Then there was Seville, a city fuelled by the joy of living and full of Andalusian hospitality. After visiting the Alcazar castle and the Catedral de Sevilla, home of Columbus' tomb and the Giralda tower (which gave them a superb panoramic view of the city from up high), they stopped in the park for a picnic and a soccer match that got everyone's legs ready for a walking tour of the historic neighborhood surrounding the Alcazar. The night ended elegantly when the students visited the world's only flamenco dance museum. The visit was crowned by a one-hour live flamenco show. The energy was palpable on the way back to the hostel as hands were clapping. feet were stomping and Kells' voices were resonating in the streets of Seville. Thankfully, as the Spanish enjoy dining late, very few were woken up from their sleep.

As the students made their way back towards Barcelona for a final day of shopping and fun, they got a chance to experience a little more of Spain's hospitality for one last time. The plane ride back seemed unexciting after a routine of delicious Spanish cuisine and cultural discoveries. Keeping Up With The Pace



Many of us in the education community are asking questions about the pace at which technology is transforming the classroom, and quite likely the student's home environment. The benefits to the students are obvious: access to information; networking in the both the classroom and

across the world; and of course, the capacity to motivate students by permitting them to work both on their own and at their own pace. Many of our concerns relate to the challenge that technology presents to educators and parents. How do we keep up-to-date with the rapid pace of innovation? What is multi-tasking in this high-tech environment doing to our (and our students') brains? How do we ensure that our students maintain a balance in their lives?

At a conference last year in Washington , DC , I had the honor of attending a session given by Dr. Larry Rosen, an internationally acclaimed expert on the psychology of technology who has regularly been quoted in magazines and been interviewed on both T.V. and radio.

As I listened to what Dr. Rosen had to say, I felt that the Kells Community could not help but benefit by hearing about the research he has done. What particularly inspired me was hearing about the generational differences in the use of technology and, as well, the impact of multi-tasking on the brain.

Subsequently, I invited Dr. Rosen to Montreal to make a presentation to the Kells community as well as to the professionals who support the school. In November of last year, a large audience made up of parents, support professionals and invited guests listened attentively as he spoke about his work. The message was clear: Technology is not only here to stay, but the pace of technology will continue to in


crease. Furthermore, it is not enough for parents, teachers and support professionals to be aware of this reality. It is imperative that they also adapt to it. (I know, easier said than done!)

But even while we use and benefit from the advantages of technology to the fullest, let us also realize that increased technology also comes with additional responsibilities on the part of all of us – parents, teachers and support professionals - to ensure our children/students maintain good physical, mental and emotional health.

To the students, Dr. Rosen offered a humorous look at the internal distraction of "thinking about technology." Students had the opportunity to view scanned images of the brain dramatically illustrating differences in the part of the brain engaged when using technology as compared to when it was engaged in reading. He explained that our brains are not wired to multi-task efficiently when tasks are complex, yet most of us believe we can.

So I think the evidence is clear. As the Director of Kells Academy, in spite of real and perceived challenges, I am determined and committed that we embrace all aspects of new technologies impacting on our educational environment. And not only for our students, who of course are our primary concern, but also for the betterment of all of us in the Kells' family. It is the way of the future and we will definitely grow with our students and be a part of this ever-changing environment.
