This genre of music is connected with hip-hop culture. Often called 'vocal percussion', it is the art of making "music with your mouth" by imitating drum machines.

Elisii, whose full name is Giancarlo Luigi Elissi, is a Montrealer and a two-time Canadian champion beatboxer who learned to beatbox by imitation. He has won a number of awards both in Canadian and International competitions.

Elissi showcased not only his beatboxing skills but also shared his knowledge about this genre. The auditorium buzzed with excitement as Elisii demonstrated the artistry of beatboxing. The students were captivated by his rhythmic beats and the incredible sounds he so effortlessly produced by only using his mouth, lips and tongue to create music.

In addition to his performance, he took the time to teach the students the three basic sounds

A Day for Awareness and Remembrance Orange Shirt Day!

September 25 to 30 is Truth and Reconciliation week across Canada – a public commemoration to mark the tragic history of residential indigenous schools in Canada. The orange shirt is a reminder and symbolic of the great loss experienced by Indigenous children over generations, in the hope that this awareness will lead to truth, justice and reconciliation with Canada's First Nations.

The Elementary School spent the week learning about the residential schools, the Orange shirt story and Indigenous Art and Culture that culminated with a special assembly for Grades 3-6 on September 29. The ceremony commenced with a land acknowledgement read by Luna Lucero-Kolb. This was followed by a number of Grade 5 and 6 students of the Spirit Committee, reading from a script that they had prepared on some basic facts pertaining to residential schools. This included topics like why we wear orange shirts, The Truth and Reconciliation Commission, the 94 calls to action, and the meaning of "Every Child Matters". We were also fortunate to welcome Chief Jessica Lazare of the Mohawk Council of Kahnawà:ke that day to address the students. She narrated the

story of her grandfather who had attended a residential school and about his life as an indigenous child of that generation. She was impressed with our students' knowledge of indigenous history and fielded many thoughtful questions. Chief Jessica Lazare's dynamic presence, her interesting stories and interaction with the students, enraptured her audience. She truly lived up to the meaning of her indigenous name – Bright Star.

Finally, the recitation of Jen Whiffin's poem "300 Sleeps" at the conclusion of the assembly had a great impact on the audience. Congratulations to the Spirit Committee for conducting the assembly with the respect and solemnity befitting the occasion.

Kells Elementary Remembrance Day Assembly Honoring our Heroes

In a deeply moving assembly on Friday, November 10th, our student body came together to pay tribute to the brave men and women who have sacrificed so much for our freedom. The Remembrance Day ceremony was a powerful event that demonstrated the compassion and respect our students hold for those who have served our country and the peacekeepers who continue to do so.

The Spirit Committee set the tone for the assembly by opening with a dedicated Remembrance Day video that the Grade 5 and 6 Spirit Committee students wrote and filmed. With a script written by Luna Lucero-Kolb and creative input from Namirah Ahmed, Sam Aljundi, Alzain Alqahtani, Rainbow Fang, Laila Haddad, Mariana Quevedo Hernandez, Marie Ogundayo and Talia Prupas, this video not only showcased the imagination of our students but also served as a reminder of the significance of the day.



Each grade played their part during the Assembly. Grades 1 and 2 laid a wreath that they had created out of colored paper adorned with poppies and together recited an emotional poem Little Poppy. Grade 3-4 students used the prompt from the book "A Poppy is to Remember," to express their

individual thoughts on the symbolism of the poppy and who it helps us remember.

Some of the Grades 5 and 6 students added a personal touch and elaborated on the phrase, "We remember because ____" and shared their thoughts and feelings in highly creative ways.

Others in Grade 6 paid homage by showcasing their artistic talents through their posters highlighting their unique perspectives on this solemn occasion of Remembrance Day. Mariana Quevedo Hernanez shared interesting information about her grandfather's courageous service as a soldier in Colombia protecting his country. In sharing this personal narrative, Mariana not only honored her grandfather's legacy but also reminded us all of the profound impact that individuals have on shaping the world we live in today.

A respectful moment of silence was observed in memory of all veterans and all those who served/serve and protect us. The commemoration closed with a reading of John McCrae's "In Flanders Fields," by the Spirit Committee.

We extend our gratitude to all the students, teachers, and the Spirit Committee for their contributions to this important assembly as we continue to learn from the lessons of history.

Teaching Generosity The Art of Giving

Community services play a big role at Kells. From an early age, students are introduced to the act of giving through various fun events that foster empathy, gratitude, compassion and community engagement.



contribute to make a difference in their community knowing that this food bank was servicing two-and-a-half times more individuals and families than before the pandemic.

A scrumptious bake sale for the N.D.G. Depot Community Food Centre was held before Christmas in December. This organization addresses issues of food insecurity in N.D.G. and surrounding areas by increasing access to healthy food, reducing social isolation, and providing educational programs nutrition and gardening. Kells Elementary has a proud history of both volunteering and raising funds for the Depot.





Magic Potions, Slithery Toads and Candy Towers

Maison Symphonique de Montreal

It was a Halloween to remember! From a field trip to the magnificent Maison Symphonique, a visit from the Eco Museum and exciting themed STEM activities, this was no humdrum Halloween at Kells Elementary.

Students in Grades 5 and 6 enjoyed a magical field trip on Halloween Day to the Maison Symphonique de Montreal. The theme of the performance was Magic Potions with Quebec actor Olivier Morin, playing the wizard. He guided the acting and the narration of the French production to the sounds of a symphony orchestra! Enhanced by the superb acoustics of the Maison Symphonique de Montréal, students enjoyed a real treat

of magical music ranging from John Williams' Hedwig's Theme from Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, to the music of Wagner, Saint-Saëns, Dukas, Moussorgski, and Berlioz.

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EcoMuseum Zoo

Slobbering toads and cobwebs! The same morning, our Grade 1-4 students welcomed a special guest to our school - Zoologist Ariane from the EcoMuseum Zoo who brought amphibians, reptiles and rodents - the perfect Halloween selections!

Ariane's presentation provided an excellent insight into the world of biodiversity by emphasizing its critical role in the food chain. Students learned many facts about amphibians and discovered that American toads are nocturnal creatures, that yellow spotted salamanders are poisonous, that their unique eye movement helps them push food down into their bellies and that there are eight different turtle species in our region, of which six are endangered. Students had the opportunity to see and touch a wood turtle - terrestrial creatures residing in the forests of Quebec whose shells are an integral part of their bodies since their spines are attached to them. To the squeals of her audience, Ariane brought out a 10-year old grey rat snake that was 1.5 meters long and is one of the 8 species of snakes in Quebec. Students also learned the difference between venomous and poisonous animals.









The visit concluded on a playful note as Ariane shared two three-year-old rats with our students. Rats, as it turns out, have a unique way of staying cool in the summer—they dip their long tails in water. These intelligent rodents enjoyed a tasty treat of soy butter while our students observed them. Ariane's visit helped students understand the diverse creatures that share our world and also highlighted the importance of preserving biodiversity and protecting endangered species.

To round off a magical day, the entire Elementary School enjoyed an afternoon of challenging STEM tasks designed to stretch their critical thinking and creativity. Candy was the theme as younger students engineered stable candy towers using only gumdrops and toothpicks, while older students enjoyed building, and then testing, candy catapults!

An Interesting Workshop held at school by the McCord Museum **Understanding our History**

In mid-November, the Grade 3-4 students immersed themselves in indigenous culture when facilitators from the McCord Stewart Museum visited the classroom to conduct a hands-on workshop entitled "Objects tell their Stories". Using the Museum's indigenous collection like a drum, a fur pelt and the wampun or basket, and helped by the Museum's facilitators, students explored how objects tell their stories and how community members view their traditions, values, and culture! This interactive and participative approach, helped the Cycle 2 students tremendously as they learned about various facets of indigenous society.







An Indoor Winter Wonderland The Winter Music Showcase

The spirit of the season came alive at our recent Winter Music Showcase on December 13th, a full-school extravaganza that transformed our cafeteria into an enchanting winter wonderland.

The Elementary students enthusiastically embraced the challenge of decorating the venue by crafting intricate, six-piece giant snowflakes to adorn the school with festive charm in preparation for the occasion. With enthusiasm and creativity, they transformed plain white paper into works of winter wonder. The process of crafting these six-piece giant snowflakes not only brought out their creativity but also fostered a sense of collaboration and teamwork.





The final musical journey was a delightful ride through a variety of genres - from timeless standards like "Auld Lang Syne" and "Jingle Bells" to centuries-old carols and modern winter-themed tunes. Our showcase also paid homage to French Canadian culture with a traditional song "Bonhomme! Bonhomme!" dating back to 17th-century Quebec. Learning Adventures in the Forest!

Outdoor excursions to the Falaise

We are delighted to announce a series of ongoing outdoor education sessions led by Ingrid Birker, formerly of the Redpath Museum Public Education Program. Four sessions are planned where Grade 6 students will experience "Forest School" in the beautiful Falaise St. Jacques, gaining cognitive, physical, psychological, and social benefits associated with outdoor education.

The Falaise, once a neglected dumping ground, has been revitalized into a thriving community forest, spanning 3 km and covering over 49 acres. Home to more than 65 different bird species, some of which use it as a stop along their migratory flight route. During the first visit in mid-January, students explored the Falaise, examining both cut and living trees, counting tree rings, and learning about various tree species. Of particular interest was a dinosaur sculpture created by volunteers from car parts dumped in the area.

In mid-February, students returned to the Falaise to build shelters. In small groups, they used branches and sticks from pruned or storm-damaged trees to create forts and stable structures. Two more activities are planned. In mid-March, students will explore animal tracks in the snow, learning about footprints and creating secret pathways in the woods. In mid-April, Earth Day will be celebrated in the Falaise, with students searching for signs of spring.

Our spring detectives eagerly anticipate these upcoming excursions to the Falaise, marking engaging learning adventures in the forest!





Distinguished Performance: Students Excel in National Math Tests

A group of talented and determined students from Grades 4, 5, and 6 participated in the prestigious math competitions organized by the Canadian Mathematica Centrum in April. This demanding annual competition is an individual event, written by elementary students across Canada, testing logical thinking and

problem-solving skills in Mathematics.



Due to their diligent preparation and weekly practice, all eleven students were awarded certificates of distinction for scoring higher than the Canadian average. Additionally, several students received medals. We have confidence in their continued excellence and anticipate further achievements in future math contests!

The Great Kindness Challenge

Creating a Culture of Kindness





The Great Kindness Challenge (GKC) was born in 2011 from the Kids for Peace movement that was started by a bunch of kids in California wanting to build a better, kinder and peaceful world through doing kind acts. Today the GKC has become a grassroots movement and the week of January 22-26 designated by schools for doing acts of kindness to help make schools, communities and the world a kinder and more compassionate place for all. At Kells Elementary, the week kicked off with students watching the Kids For Peace 2024 Great Kindness Challenge video and then reflecting on and discussing what kindness means and how they can demonstrate kindness.

During the entire week students were encouraged to perform random acts of kindness. As a start, the students created Kindness Flowers and, on the petals, wrote about the many ways they could be kind. Every Grade had special tasks to work on throughout the week. Grades 1 and 2 took part in discussions and activities related to the book Kindness Is My Superpower. Grades 3 and 4 were challenged to perform the actions that they had written about on the petals of their kindness flowers, by the end of the week. Grades 5 and 6 students learned about the kindness boomerang and completed written assignments about it. They also discussed kindness in expressing gratitude and wrote short notes to members of the school community. In addition, Grade 6 had discussions, wrote reflections, and apology letters to anyone they could have treated with more kindness. They also participated in discussions about how to sustain a culture of kindness in school and how they can support each other as classmates.

These activities, as well as our ongoing commitment to maintaining a peaceful environment, has once again earned us the title of a Kids For Peace Kindness Certified School. The Kindness Garden hanging in the hallway, containing all of the Kindness Flowers, continues to serve as a visual reminder that Kindness is Cool.

International Day at Kells

Justin last visited Kells at the age of 16, when his dance teacher, famed dancer Ethel Bruneau, led a Black History Workshop for our students. Now a professional dancer, he spoke of the profound connection between

Black History and Dance and explained how dance served as a powerful form of expression during periods of slavery and adversity.

Justin's performances are heavily influenced by pop and black culture and this was apparent in the tap dance that he performed for the students. He followed this by speaking and teaching his young audience some basic dance moves. This turned his visit into both an interactive and educational experience! Justin's warm and engaging personality resonated well with the students who thoroughly enjoyed his workshop.

Pink Shirt Day started after an incident at a school in Nova Scotia when a new grade 9 student was bullied for wearing a pink shirt to school. Two grade 12 students, David Shepherd and Travis Price, were determined to show support for this student. They bought fifty pink shirts and the next day, handed them out at school. The bullied boy walked in and as Price later said 'his face spoke volumes'. From that one act of kindness, Pink Shirt Day was born. Wednesday in February is the national Pink Shirt/anti-bullying day.

At Kells Elementary, Pink Shirt Day was held on February 20th. We distributed pink t-shirts to the entire student body and staff to wear at school and at a special assembly, held a school-wide discussion about bullying and acts of kindness. Grade 6 shared their unique poems centered around the theme of bullying, Grade 5 and 6 students expressed their thoughts on What Kindness Means to Me... and Grade 3 and 4 students recited lines from A Kindness Poem. The assembly concluded with a performance of The Kindness Song by the Grade 1 and 2 students who were supported by members of the Spirit Committee.







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
